Welcome to INPUT 2002 Rotterdam; Free Port of Television. During the upcoming week the city of Rotterdam, which has become one of the major audiovisual cities in The Netherlands, will provide the stage for numerous screenings of the most adventurous and innovative television programmes, debates and discussions from and with your colleagues from all over the world. In addition to the conference, INPUT 2002 Rotterdam will host the television festival NO ZAPPING for the Dutch audience, which will take place from 18 – 20 May 2002. It goes without saying that you are more than invited to attend this festival as well.

In this chapter you will find some useful information to make your stay in Rotterdam as pleasant and fruitful as possible.

LOCATION

INPUT 2002 Rotterdam will take place in the Concert and Conference Center De Doelen.

Fully refurbished and modernised in 2000, the complex offers facilities representing the state of the art in the field of conferences: large halls for plenary meetings and numerous medium-sized and smaller rooms for screenings, debates, and workshops.

The ground floor – The Global Village - will accommodate the registration and information desk, the service center, the mailboxes, a grand café and several installations which will demonstrate the possibilities of the television of the future.

The first floor will accommodate Screening Room A: the Jurriaanse Room, as well as the location for the producer's hours

The third floor will accommodate Screening Room B: the Willem Burger Room, the Internet Café, and two On Demand Rooms

The fourth floor will accommodate Screening Room C: the Fortis Room, the Video Library for individual screenings, one On Demand Room and the Shop Steward Room.

It is hard to believe that an organization like INPUT has managed to survive for a quarter of a century. It is sometimes even harder to believe that there are still hundreds of writers, directors, editors and others involved in programme making around the world who have not given up their commitment to public service television.

Some countries are still struggling to establish non-commercial broadcasting services. In other countries public television is close to giving up

under political and commercial pressures. With its annual screening conference, its workshops and Mini-INPUTS all over the world - INPUT is trying to help on the one hand to sustain the public service tradition in its increasingly beleaguered heart-lands and on the other to encourage its growth in the developing nations of the world.

Over recent years, independent producers have come to play an increasingly important role within INPUT.

It comes close to a miracle that every year another country, another broadcaster, another city or an alliance of different organizations hosts the conference. This year we have to thank our colleagues in the Netherlands for their efforts, for their patience and for their ideas. But they are only providing the framework for this week. Together with the National Co-ordinators, the shopstewards and the members of the Board they prepared the ground for you, the delegates, the filmmakers, the commissioning editors and the producers to make of it what you will with your contribution - your ideas and your arguments.
